Improving children's lives by transforming harmful beliefs surrounding disability

Letter from the Co-founder and Œ

Dear Friends,

2023 marks 20 years since Kupenda for the Children became an official 501c(3) non-profit organization. This milestone has caused me to reflect on how much has changed since I first met 15 children with disabilities in Kenya who needed access to education. Back then, I could not have imagined that thousands of children with disabilities would be benefiting from our work in 14 countries! All of this is because of our community of supporters around the world who are working to transform harmful beliefs about disabilities into those that improve children's lives.

Today, Kupenda and our worldwide network of advocates continue to reduce disability stigma and address the most pressing needs for people with disabilities. Our global footprint is increasing through disability inclusion consultations, trainings, and resource sharing with international partner organizations. Last year, 114,998 children in 14 countries became more fully included in their communities while accessing the education and medical interventions they needed. This is significant since people with disabilities are often overlooked, even by organizations focused on the marginalized. Because of this work, thousands of children once told they were cursed are now experiencing the love of community, family, themselves, and God.

While our work reducing stigma around the world has the greatest long-lasting impact for the most people, we continue to provide direct services to families with disabilities that are most in need in Kilifi County, Kenya, where our central offices are located. This allows us to witness the influence of our work on individuals and their families. This impact was particularly evident in 2023, when I had the privilege of reconnecting with one of the first families we worked with 20 years ago.

I met Nassir, a tiny little boy with cerebral palsy, when Kupenda was more of an idea than an actual organization. His family did not believe he could learn, and the community thought his disability was the result of witchcraft. Kupenda responded by counseling the family on the true, medical causes of Nassir's disability and supported him to attend a school where he regularly interacted with students with a variety of disabilities, including children who were deaf.

Today Nassir is over 20 years old and towers above me. It brought tears to my eyes when he told me he wanted to become a professional sign language interpreter to help people like the friends he made at school. It is powerful to see students we've invested in giving back and leading the communities that once rejected them. People like Nassir make our impact truly exponential.

Spending time with Nassir is a reminder that behind every number we report is a person. A person who is transformed. A person who is serving. A person who is loved. A person who would likely be left without loving community or access to the education and resources they needed if not for the work of our talented staff, partners, volunteers, community leaders, families, and supporters.


Saving Lives in Sierra Leone

Since 2018, Kupenda has partnered with World Hope International (WHI) in Sierra Leone to train 87 pastors and 24 traditional healers about the medical causes of disability, effective interventions, and how to counsel and refer families for support. These leaders then gave disability awareness talks to thousands. They also helped hundreds of people impacted by disabilities register for government services; referred parents to support groups; and provided food, clothing, transportation, and counseling services throughout their communities.

One pastor participant even reported, "These campaigns have resulted to one native doctor who used to destroy disabled babies to completely stop the practice."

Sharon's Story

Sharon's community believed her seizures, limited speech, and mental health challenges were caused by witchcraft. Even her own family had difficulty understanding her and would beat her when she did not meet expectations.

Fortunately, a Kupenda-trained disability advocate started providing counseling and care to Sharon and her family and ensured the abuse ceased. The leader also helped her enroll in school and see a doctor who diagnosed her with epilepsy and prescribed medication.

Today Sharon 's grandmother says, "I am so much grateful, because it is through Kupenda's counseling sessions which have enabled me to understand Sharon's condition. My negative attitudes have now changed. Through Kupenda, I have been able to attend some trainings on caregiving for children with developmental disorders. I have been implementing the teachings on my grandchild. She no longer undergoes physical abuse. Her siblings and neighbors have understood her and now they love and protect her."

The pages that follow describe the impact of Kupenda's medical and education programs over the past year. This work is conducted on a smaller scale than our advocacy program because, in recent years, Kupenda has evolved to be more than a direct service organization. This change came about when we realized that training influential local leaders about disability justice reduces harmful beliefs about disability and supports long-term inclusion and support for people with disabilities. Over the past 10 years, we expanded this disability advocacy work and, as a result, the leaders we've trained have improved the lives of thousands of children with disabilities throughout sub-Saharan Africa. At the same time, we've continued to serve 1,000 Kenyan children with disabilities through our medical and education programs. This sample enables us to provide direct support to the most needy families while tracking the impact of our advocacy work to inform program improvements.

Martin's Story

Martin is young boy that contracted tuberculosis and became permanently deaf. His only means of communicating with his family were gestures, which the family did not always understand.

Kupenda came alongside Martin and provided funds for him to attend school, receive three meals a day, and learn to communicate using Kenyan Sign Language. Today, Martin is healthy, doing well in all subjects, and is even considered the class leader.

Martin's mother said, "I feel good now that my child is in school and can now communicate with us at home. [Martin's progress] has given me courage to visit two children with disabilities in our community who were just left at home while others went to school. I talked to the parents on the importance of taking those children to school and referred them. Today one of them joined [school], and the other is enrolled in a special unit near home."

Samson's Story

Samson was born with cerebral palsy and hydrocephalus, which caused him to have limited speech, mild cognitive delays, breathing challenges, and a short stature. His parents struggledto meet his needs due to a prolonged drought that affected their finances and caused the family to often go hungry.

Fortunately, Kupenda staff provided Samson's family with a food stipend, referred him to a health facility where he received a lifesaving procedure and medicine, and supported him to attend school.

Today, Samson is doing well in his classes and enjoys playing soccer and singing!




